4. According to Warren Bennis, pioneer in the field of modern Leadership Studies, "Leadership is the capacity to translate vision into reality." In 1-2 paragraphs, describe your vision for the 2023-24 school year and how you plan to "translate" it into reality?

The 2023-2024 school year will mark the first time that the Vivian Webb School and Webb School of California classes will graduate together, and the first year with a different administrative structure with Dr. Smith as the Head of Schools. Things at Webb will change as we move through next year, and we can use this time to improve and emerge as a stronger community that is more responsive, comfortable, and overall pleasant for everyone involved. I envision the 2023-2024 school year as a year for the Webb student body to make conscious decisions about how we want our school to run.

I plan to create this better reality by promoting openness and deliberation within the school overall, and reform within student government. For example, we often repeat traditions each year without really considering if they are meaningful and make sense for our community. Through open discussions about events like Webb Idol and Webb Day, we can see if students still value these events, and perhaps create new traditions that resonate with our present rather than senselessly carrying forward the past. Within Student Government, we must focus on developing individually and as a team, maintaining strong and frequent communication, and prioritizing organization so our work can be as effective and fulfilling as possible.

5. Which of the Four Pillars of Stu Gov resonates most with you, your values, your interests, and your goals – Service, Advocacy, Joyful Engagement, or Collaboration? In one paragraph, please explain your connection with this pillar.

I connect most with the Service pillar. I believe that Webb, as a school, has the resources and the obligation to give back to the community. Currently, we are not doing enough. As we move through the year and plan events, whether as a school or in our individual leadership groups, we must consider the overall impact of the choices we make. I believe in an impact-driven decision-making process to hopefully produce the best consequences of our actions. I also hope that Student Government can lead through example to motivate students to serve not just Webb but the larger community of their own accord in meaningful ways. The service day of Dies Mulieres demonstrated the wide range of what is possible with Webb's resources, but also that students can only get as much out of service as they are willing to give. As exec, I will ensure that Webb becomes a force of good in the wider community.

Although the Webb student body is composed of individuals with very different life experiences, priorities, and desires, students mainly want their voices to be heard, especially by the administration. Over the past year, students have realized that their voices are not listened to. There are many policies and situations which do not reflect the values and experiences of our student body, and students want the school to change. For example, students want the administration to listen to their concerns about the dress code, dorm life, and day student parking and lockers. Webb needs to listen to its students and change accordingly.
