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#### **What does it mean to be an Executive Officer of Stu Gov?**

Being an Executive Officer (Exec) at The Webb Schools means you are an elected representative of the entire student body. To serve effectively in this role requires the Exec's commitment to prioritize leading by example through shaping and embracing the goals, values, and mission of the Webb Schools in words, action, and spirit.

Holding an executive position in student government means the student body has entrusted you with the responsibility to be their voice, and the power to wield it mindfully, respectfully, and effectively. To serve as a Student Government Executive Officer means more than simply leading school assemblies and running Student Government meetings. It means you understand and embody the Four Pillars of Student Government -

- Service
- Advocacy
- Joyful Engagement
- Collaboration

#### **What are the responsibilities of a Student Government Executive Officer?**

- Train and Lead Student Government Officers and Commissioners
- Serve as a role model for the student body
- Act as an ombudsman
  - for the Student Body to communicate their hopes, wishes, thoughts, and concerns to the deans;
  - for Student Government Officers and Commissioners to communicate goals, ideas, questions, and plans to the deans and the student body.
  - for the deans to communicate information, hopes, feedback, and concerns to the student body.
- Organize and Execute community events
- Inspire and Encourage behavior that aligns with the Four Pillars of Student Government
- Plan, Attend, and Lead
  - Weekly Meetings with the Student Government Advisor(s)
  - Weekly Student Government Meetings
  - Bi-Weekly School Assemblies
- Collaborate with other Heads of Webb Leadership Groups

## **Campaign Guidelines**

## **Speech Guidelines**

- Focus on goals and vision
- Focus equally on content and delivery
- No passing out candy, treats, gifts, favors
- No more than 2 minutes in length
- No negative comments or character attacks on current officers or other candidates
- No use of profanity or derogatory language
- Avoid unrealistic promises (ex. "If you elect me, I will eliminate Lights Out and homework.")

  - c. I am social and love meeting new people, and can help and talk with students, and help others adjust to the school environment. I could give comfort and joy to different students.
4. According to Warren Bennis, pioneer in the field of modern Leadership Studies, “Leadership is the capacity to translate vision into reality.” In 1-2 paragraphs, describe your vision for the 2023-24 school year and how you plan to “translate” it into reality?

Webb has always been a second home to me, and I had found great importance in finding problems which could be solved by the community. After being at Webb for almost 2 years, I have had a lot of things in which I wanted change to occur, however was minor enough to ignore and forget about as I knew Webb would eventually fix it as time goes by. There was, however, one aspect at Webb which I found to be a huge problem: the vast separation of students. Many times, especially for my grade, many students want to remain in their own cliques and groups, and don't bother themselves to ever reach out to other students. Even for me, I usually only hang around with a group of people, and even if I wanted to reach out to others I couldn't because of the “clique” I was already in. Calling people “NPC” (Non-playable Character) has become very commonplace in our community, and I think clearly represents the division between one person to another. I think this is apparent even in schools apart from Webb, however I want Webb to really feel like a community. Even though it would be hard for our school to adjust it first, I think REALLY getting to know more people and making more connections would make the community much tighter and help strengthen the Webb School life as a whole.

In the 2023-2024 school year, I would try to advocate for any sort of event which connects different students in different groups. Having them work together to solve something, or to learn new things with them could all be helpful in bringing different students together. I always found these activities very exciting, as I could meet new people and get to know who they really were, and it was so interesting to see how different they seemed before and after I got to know them. Another important steppingstone is the community dinner, and I feel like if they switched up the seating every week or so, it would help students get to know others much better. Community dinner helped me make new friends I had never thought of being with, and realized how important it was to connect with people I did not know with. Having a more frequent way of connecting with others, especially while eating, would be helpful in connecting the community. Finally, as the VWS and WSC combine in the following years, I think it would be helpful for Webb to connect the WSC and VWS more, as it would be helpful for the transition if the 2 classes knew each other before the schools collide.

5. Which of the Four Pillars of Stu Gov resonates most with you, your values, your interests, and your goals – Service, Advocacy, Joyful Engagement, or Collaboration? In one paragraph, please explain your connection with this pillar.

I think the pillar which resonates with me the most is collaboration. I find collaboration the most important aspect of getting things done the right way, as collaborative work includes different perspectives and ideas which can combine to form a perfect solution. From when I was young, however, I had always struggled with collaboration. I was a quiet kid and worked best alone or with a teacher. I always became quiet when I had to work with others, and even though I most of the time had an opinion about the assignments, I would keep quiet and follow along their way. However, as time went on, I became better at communicating my thoughts to my

peers, and I began to become better at working with others. This, in turn, also improved my social skills, and helped me state my opinions and thoughts, and made my personality sparkle much more than before. I feel like collaboration is key in many aspects a community needs to have and could help students connect with others easily than it was before.

6. Senator Diane Feinstein is attributed with saying, “Ninety percent of leadership is the ability to communicate something people want.” What do you believe is the greatest desire of the student body?

I think the biggest thing the student body wants is less stress. Stress, due to school and personal conflicts, are very common in high school, and I believe more in a boarding school like Webb. The stress of work, the stress of adjusting, the stress of expectations, the stress of social issues, all are apparent especially in the boarding community, where many live apart from their parents. I believe lessening the stress, either with more communication and fun activities, could be very foremost for our community’s wants.
